

## About ReWA

Refugee Women’s Alliance (ReWA)—a nationally recognized, multi-ethnic, non-profit organization—promotes inclusion, independence, personal leadership, and strong communities by providing refugee and immigrant women and their families with culturally- and linguistically-appropriate services. ReWA advocates for social justice, public policies, and equal access to services while respecting cultural values and the right to self-determination.

In 1985, a group of successfully resettled refugee women sought to fill a gap for newly arrived women by providing services for their unique needs in their native languages. Now one of the largest refugee and immigrant service providers in the Puget Sound area, ReWA successfully transitions thousands of families each year into self-sufficient, contributing members of our community.

### ReWA serves over 11,000 refugees and immigrants each year:

- 10 culturally appropriate programs provide wraparound services to our clients and are often cited and replicated by other community-based organizations.
- 140+ staff represent and are members of the communities we serve.
- Over 85% of our staff and 2/3 of our board are immigrants, refugees, or people of color.
- Over 50 languages and dialects spoken—**the most of any agency in King County.**
